Who are the Stolen Generations?

From the late 1800s and throughout much of the 1900s, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children were forcibly removed from their families and communities by governments, churches and welfare organisations. These removals were part of deliberate assimilation policies intended to absorb Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children into non-Indigenous society and sever their connections to family, community, language and culture.

The impacts continue today.

An estimated 5,300 Stolen Generations survivors remain in Queensland, many of whom are ageing and experience significantly poorer health outcomes. Half of all Stolen Generations descendants have been diagnosed with a mental health condition.

It's time to turn awareness into action.
